I don't know what your hopes and dreams for your life are, but I'm guessing that you want it to be *good*. Everyone wants to live life to the full in one way or another—whether that's travelling the world, finding the perfect partner, making millions or just having plenty of time to sit on the sofa and chill.

Did you know that Jesus came to give us life to the full? He said it in John 10 v 10. Jesus promises that when we follow him, we will experience life as it's meant to be lived—because we're connected to the God who made both us and everything around us.

Life with Jesus isn't always straightforward or easy, but it is the good life. It's a life of purpose, wisdom and hope, where we get to walk alongside Jesus and learn from him every single day.

That's what this course is all about. We'll talk about who Jesus is, what it looks like to follow him and how he enables us to keep going. Whether you're sure that you're a Christian, you're on the fence or you're new to it all, this is your invitation to explore Jesus' offer of life with him—his offer of life to the full.

# HOW IT WORKS



Each session contains four elements:

**Meet...** A little story to get you thinking about the topic.

**Bible Time.** A short Bible study that connects with the scenario you just read about.

**Think it Through.** Two pages of teaching to read, together with a few questions to discuss.

**Reflect.** Use this space to write a prayer, scribble down key points you want to remember, or anything else. Your leader might give you specific ideas for filling this page in some sessions.

### FOR LEADERS

At the back of the book you'll find ideas for games and reflection activities—one each per session. These are primarily designed for youth groups, but most of the reflections will still work if you're using this book in a smaller discipleship meet-up.

Be creative about how you use this book—it'll work best differently in different settings! For example, you could...

- Start with an activity, or put one in the middle of the session to break things up.
- Choose just one part of the **Think it Through** pages (they're always divided into two sections), whichever works best for your group.
- Use the **Think it Through** pages as the basis for a short talk or seminar.
- Perform the **Meet...** section as a drama.
- Do part of the session as one big group, then divide into smaller groups for other parts.
- Ask the young people to do **Bible Time** on their own in advance, then focus on **Think it Through** in the time you have together.
- Turn the course into four super-sessions by combining the chapters into groups of three.
- Add your own questions, games, creative reflection ideas and anything else!

Finally, make sure you leave time to pray—both as leaders and when the group meets. After all, this course on its own will not bring growth in Christ. It is God who makes people more like his Son, through his word and by his Spirit.



### THINK IT THROUGH





To understand who the winners are in this victory, we need to wind the clock back to the beginning of history. God made a world of beauty and wonder where humans could share his joy. But humanity rejected God's rule. We wanted to be gods of our own lives. We still do. This is what the Bible calls "sin". Our rebellion has put us on a collision course with God.

\* What do you think it means to try to be "gods of our own lives"?

Can you think of ways in which people might try to do this, even if they wouldn't express it that way?

Jesus came to defeat evil. That's really good news. Unless you're a rebel against God—and all of us start life as rebels against God. For rebels, Jesus' victory means defeat and judgment.

That's not good.

But the wonderful twist in the story is that we *can* share in Jesus' victory, even though we've rebelled against him. How? Because God's judgment fell upon Jesus himself at the cross. Jesus died under God's judgment in our place so we could go free. Three days later God raised him to life again as the beginning of God's new people and the Lord of God's restored kingdom.

Jesus' victory is good news for sinners!

\* Jesus has already defeated sin and death and, if we follow him, we share in that victory. How could this change life now?

### WHAT IT'S ALL ABOUT

Here are some assumptions that people make about Christianity.

It's about trying to be good.

It's about believing that God exists.

It's about being religious and going to church.

\* Why might someone making each of those statements assume that Christianity is not for them?

The truth is that first and foremost, Christianity is about Jesus. He has won a victory, and we get to share in it! This means that...

Christianity is not about trying to be good—though it does transform us.

Christianity is not a new set of opinions—though it does make us see many things differently.

Christianity is not becoming religious—though it will make us want to pray.

First and foremost, Christianity is about Jesus, his victory and how we get to share that victory.

★ Is there any way in which you need to reset your own thinking about what Christianity is all about?

★ Is there any way in which faith in Jesus hasn't yet changed your life, but you want it to?
