

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT

Take ten minutes with your family each day.

Whether you have a child of three or eighteen, this flexible, easy-to-use resource will allow the whole family to celebrate a month of meals with Jesus.

The devotions we've created aim to be an achievable joy, not an unrealistic burden. No more than ten minutes are needed to complete a daily section. If you want to take longer, that's great!

We spend three days exploring each meal, followed by a "hit the heart" day to draw the themes of that meal together and apply them to our hearts.

There are two charts on pages 8-9. One shows you how to use these stories during Lent, as you build up to the Easter weekend. The other shows how you can use them at any time of year, on four days per week. Choose whichever approach works best for your family.

And if you'd like a bit more help, any tricky questions include an example answer in brackets after the question. There are also some top tips on page 123 at the back of the book.

I am so grateful to Tim Chester for his book A *Meal with Jesus*, which inspired, encouraged and advised me as I wrote these studies for my family and yours.

DAY 1 Leaving it all behind

Where are we going today?

Jesus picked a hated tax collector to become his friend. Levi left everything to follow Jesus.

READY?

- **Optional.** Can each person grab two or three objects that are precious to them or that represent favourite activities? Parents might grab a purse, a family picture or their car keys. Children might grab a soft toy, a screen, a photo of a friend, a soccer ball or a favourite piece of clothing.
- Open your Bible to Luke 5 v 27-28 (or read the passage from page 12).

LET'S GO!

Pray: Dear Father, help us to understand what is most precious. Amen.

Perhaps try...

- Lay out your precious items on the floor.
- What emergency would it take for you to run out of your home right now and leave them *all* behind?
- If you can't do this activity, ask a quick question instead: Which object is most precious to you?
- Link: In today's story Levi left everything to follow Jesus.

This week's story

- Where are we in the Bible? Jesus has begun to cause a stir. News is spreading about him. Crowds have been gathering. Now it is time for Jesus to choose a group of friends to be his disciples.
- Look out for what we are told about the man Jesus chooses. (Look at the box on page 13 for more about tax collectors.)
- *Read* the passage.

Luke 5 v 27-28

²⁷ After this, Jesus went out and saw a tax collector named Levi sitting in the tax office. Jesus said to him, "Follow me!" ²⁸ Levi got up, left everything, and followed Jesus.

Questions for us all

- 1. What do you think a tax collector would have on his desk? (If you want, you could put your wallet, phone and house keys out in front of you.)
- 2. What sort of things do you imagine would fill Levi's normal working day?

Question for 3s and 4s

What did Levi do when Jesus said, "Follow me"?

Question for 5-7s

What did Levi take with him, as he went to follow Jesus?

Question for over-7s

Why would Levi or you leave everything to follow someone?

Question for teens

You make choices each day about who to follow, who to be with, who to listen to, who to imitate... How do you make those decisions? What is it about Jesus that has attracted you to following him? OR What would Jesus need to be like for you or your friends to choose to follow him?

Think and pray

Thank Jesus for the good things he has given you. Have you discovered what you value more than Jesus? Talk to him about that.

Got time to chat?

What and who we value leads quickly to the decisions we make. Think about how you choose to fill your spare time, which people you choose to be around, and who you wish you could see more often. Can you see from these decisions what you value, what you love, who you trust, and how you choose friends? Levi saw in Jesus all that he valued, all that he needed, and exactly who he needed to listen to.

Something more for the adults?

We know the tax collector Levi better as Matthew, the writer of the first Gospel. It's intriguing that Matthew chose not to write about his own calling in his Gospel, but instead he tells us about his friends being called to follow Jesus. Read Matthew 4 v 18-22. Matthew must have smiled as he wrote this and remembered his own story. What do we learn about discipleship from these passages? Before you load a burden on yourself to be more, to think more, or to do more, just take a moment to ponder what we learn about Jesus' role in discipleship.

A note about tax collectors

Levi was a tax collector: a Jew working for the Roman Empire. The Roman Empire had invaded the Jewish country, had made life harder for the Jewish people, and had killed some of Levi's own people. So the Jewish people hated the Roman Empire for taking away their freedom. This meant that Levi and other tax collectors were hated traitors. They were collecting money from their own people to give to the Roman Empire; that money paid for the hated Roman soldiers to stay in their country!

It gets even worse. The tax collectors could charge whatever they liked. So if Levi's Jewish neighbour owed two denarii, he could charge them three or four denarii and keep the extra money. Tax collectors got rich by stealing money from their own people. And if anyone argued, the Roman soldiers were on hand. Can you imagine how much the Jewish people hated Levi and the other tax collectors?

Jesus chose Levi! No one else chose to even talk to Levi. But Jesus went back to Levi's for a party. Why? Did Jesus know what Levi had done?

The strongest porty DAY 2

Where are we going today?

Jesus chose to go home with the worst of people for a party with other scumbags.

READY?

- **Optional.** Collect a few objects for each member of the family, to represent people. Some toy characters? Or just some big spoons?
- Open up your Bible to Luke 5 v 29-30 (or read the passage from page 15).

LET'S GO!

Pray: Dear Father, please help us to understand why Jesus chose to make friends with mean people. Amen.

Perhaps try...

- Each person picks two of their best friends. Tell each other about them. Why do you like them?
- Now imagine totally opposite people. Use the objects you've collected to represent these imaginary people. So, if your friend loves playing with you, imagine someone who only spoils your games and shouts at you. If your friend is kind, imagine someone selfish and mean. Let's give these imaginary anti-friends names such as Mean Milly or Angry Alan.
- If you can't do this activity, ask a quick question instead: Describe someone you would never want as a friend.

• Link: How would it feel walking into a party of those people? That is exactly where Jesus goes in today's story.

This week's story

- Where are we in the Bible? Jesus walked up to Levi and told him, "Follow me". Where did they go next?
- Look out for what the Jewish leaders were angry about.
- *Read* the passage.

Luke 5 v 29-30

²⁹ Then Levi gave a big dinner for Jesus. The dinner was at Levi's house. At the table there were many tax collectors and other people, too. ³⁰ But the Pharisees and the men who taught the law for the Pharisees began to complain to the followers of Jesus. They said, "Why do you eat and drink with tax collectors and 'sinners'?"

Questions for us all

- 1. Who was at the party?
- 2. What made the Jewish leaders so angry?

Question for 3s and 4s

Levi made a great big yummy dinner for Jesus. What do you think they ate?

Question for 5-7s

Levi and the other tax collectors knew that everyone else thought they were bad people, always doing the wrong thing. Who do you think Levi normally invited to his parties?

Question for over-7s

Normally, only tax collectors and sinners went to parties like Levi's. No one like Jesus had ever come to one. Who would you invite to your party who would be amazed to be invited? How would you feel about inviting them? (It is easy to think of someone who you wouldn't normally invite. The challenge is to think of someone who would love to be invited to your party. Perhaps you would feel pleased to amaze someone, or a little cross that they get to enjoy your party without deserving it.)

Question for teens

What do you know about tax collectors in Jesus' day? Look at the note on page 13. If you knew all this about Levi, what might you have been thinking as Levi walked with Jesus, taking him back to his house? What do you think you might have blurted out to Jesus as he walked past you? (Some of us would want to tell Jesus all about Levi, in case he hadn't realized. Others of us might feel a little jealous that Jesus hadn't chosen to spend time with us. The best of us might want to say, "Finally! We have someone in authority who is kind to all and listens to the marginalised!")

Think and pray

Thank Jesus that he is a friend to the friendless and to those that most people hate. Is there anyone like that who you want to pray for?

Got time to chat?

It can be lonely to feel as if you're on the outside, with people pointing at you. Sometimes we can be the ones doing the pointing. What do others do, that makes you think, "They are wrong. That is bad. They should be punished"? Sometimes we are the ones being pointed at, because we have done something wrong. Which of those two—pointing at others or being pointed at—do you think is normally you? Does this story teach you something?

Something more for the adults?

Paul was very clear that he was one of those sinners that Jesus had chosen to love. In fact, Paul said he was the worst of sinners! Read 1 Timothy 1 v 15-17. When you find yourself feeling crushed by your sin, how does Paul offer a way forward for your broken heart? Read carefully. Paul sees that he was shown mercy and patience. Jesus Christ not only offers us a way out of our shame and despair but lifts our faces to the one who offers our hearts soaring, joyful, hope-filled worship. What a Saviour we have!
